Ephraim, A Cake Not Turned

Hosea 7:8 " Ephraim has mixed himself among the peoples; Ephraim is a cake unturned.

Historical accounts say that in the East when a cake was baked, a corner of the hearth was swept clean and the batter was poured out on the clean spot, after which hot embers were put on top. Then the cake was turned over and embers were put on the other side, thus making a cake cook on both sides. The process was repeated until the cake (bread) was uniformly cooked just right for eating. A cake not turned would be burned on one side and raw on the other side.

The description of the tribe of Ephraim is not a good one but before we get into to the characteristics of this tribe, let's take a look at some background information about the man from which the tribe began.
